Greetings:

Meeting was called to order at 1:30 p.m. by Secretary of Aging, Rona Kramer. In her greetings, Secretary Kramer advised that the Department of Aging has ramped up with a high level of activity since the end of February. She furthered that home delivered meals have increased by 500% since the COVID. Secretary Kramer informed the group about the "DME" (Durable Medical Equipment) Program is available to all Marylanders, all ages, free of charge, to obtain walkers, wheelchairs, and other types of medical equipment. The DME is currently open for collections and donations, but not yet for distribution.

Approval of the Minutes:

The Committee Members approved the August 27, 2020 minutes.

Updates from Legislative Subcommittee:

Eric Colchamiro discussed the Subcommittee letter and report that will be submitted for proposed legislation in September. <u>Click here to view the letter</u>.

Eric began by introducing the report and reviewed it section by section as follows:

- 1) Testing and PPE
 - a. Address social isolation / outdoor and indoor visitation
 - b. Outdoor in place
 - c. Rapid turnaround testing
 - d. Securing facilities
- 2) Workforce Safety and Development
 - a. Patient care maintaining quality of staff / staffing shortages / taking care of staff
 - b. Recruitment and staff development wage studies, tuition incentives to retain staff
 - c. Taskforce to review recruitment and retention recognizing the value of staff
 - d. Maryland Board of Nursing increase nursing assistants waivers in place to increase workforce
 - e. Valuing staff
- 3) Nursing Homes and Assisted Living Facility Oversight and Transparency of Data
 - a. Notes that despite regulations being in place, OHCQ has done common fear?
 - b. Should be surveyed on sight annually
 - c. MDH COVID website name
 - d. Decision to update date once a week
- 4) Provider Reimbursement and Systems issues
 - a. Medicare increases should be passed along to workers, to provide more competitive wages
 - b. Hospital systems/ entire care spectrum stop putting them in silos how do we help them as a whole?

- 5) Quality of Life for Resident and Staff
 - a. Value of Alzheimer's and dementia care standards staff made to know who to deal with these individuals
 - b. Social isolation
 - c. Focus on area of care and concern
